5	This hearing of the Cornwall Public Inquiry
6	is now in session. The Honourable Mr. Justice Normand
7	Glaude, Commissioner, presiding.
8	Please be seated. Veuillez vous asseoir.
9	STATEMENT BY THE COMMISSIONER/DÉCLARATION PAR LE
10	COMMISSAIRE:
11	THE COMMISSIONER: I'm glad to see I'm not
12	the only one that's rusty this afternoon.
13	(LAUGHTER/RIRES)
14	THE COMMISSIONER: Good afternoon, everyone
15	I hope counsel and those in attendance had some opportunity
16	for a restful break at some time over the last four or five
17	weeks.
18	I would like to take a brief opportunity to
19	speak to those of you who are here today or observing
20	through the webcast. I find it useful after a break to
21	regularly review our work schedule in the public domain so
22	that there is a shared understanding of what to expect and
23	also to keep the public informed.
24	This week and the following week of August
25	20 <sup>th</sup> , we will be completing testimony given by individuals

1	who were victims or alleged victims of childhood sexual
2	abuse. This has been an important part of the work to date
3	and we expect to complete before Labour Day.
4	We will also complete context evidence work
5	by hearing from the Catholic District School Board of
6	Eastern Ontario during the month of September.
7	We have had a series of experts providing
8	key background information related to the work of this
9	Inquiry. Later this month and in September, we will hear
10	expert witnesses in respect to the Roman Catholic Church.
11	We expect this testimony be completed by September 13 <sup>th</sup> of
12	2007.
13	It is my intention to update you again the
14	week of September $17^{\rm th}$ when we start the community context
15	part of the Inquiry's schedule of evidence. I will be
16	taking time that day to convey a thorough understanding of
17	this Inquiry's schedule as we move to complete our
18	hearing's mandate, including the addition of more hearing
19	time to complete our goals.
20	I will also be taking the opportunity to
21	provide updates on progress and plans for Phase II work,
22	"Renewal in Cornwall".
23	Moving back to our current work, at our last
24	sitting date, Friday, June $29^{\rm th}$ , 2007, we had moved in

camera to view certain videotapes related to interviews of

1	Mr. Ron Leroux, one taken by Mr. Dunlop and two by OPP
2	officers. We did not complete viewing these videotapes,
3	and so we will be moving back into an in camera session to
4	complete this work.
5	I would note that I have already ruled that
6	these videotapes would be heard in camera because the names
7	of certain individuals are mentioned. These names are
8	already subject to monikers and publication bans.
9	Now, before rising to change into the in
10	camera setting, we will be airing the audiotape. We will,
11	after that, rise and go into the in camera session. I have
12	already ruled that the audiotape is not subject to any
13	confidentiality measures or publication ban and should be
14	heard in public, and any remaining cross-examination of Mr.
15	Leroux will be completed this week.
16	I remind any individuals in attendance in
17	person today that only those who have signed party
18	undertakings in respect to confidentiality may remain
19	during the in camera sessions of the Inquiry.
20	Accordingly, Madam Clerk well, unless
21	let's hear from Mr. Dumais. Are there any other opening
22	remarks from you?
23	MR. DUMAIS: Just a few housekeeping
24	matters, Commissioner.
25	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you.

1	PRELIMINARY MATTERS BY/MATIÈRES PRÉLIMINAIRES PAR MR.

3	MR. DUMAIS: As has been our practice, I
4	would like to introduce a new face, Commissioner. There is
5	a new counsel that will be representing the interests of
6	Mr. Jacques Leduc. Her name, I'm advised, is Danielle
7	Robitaille.
8	THE COMMISSIONER: Bonjour, Madame
9	Robitaille.
10	MR. DUMAIS: She's standing, and she will be
11	replacing Jill Makepeace.
12	THE COMMISSIONER: Thank you.
13	MR. DUMAIS: A few other housekeeping
14	matters, Commissioner, which deal more specifically with
15	the next witness coming up or the witness that we started
16	at the end of June, Mr. Leroux, over time we have had some
17	exchange of correspondence between Commission counsel and
18	his therapist, Dr. Wayne Nadler. One of the last pieces of
19	correspondence that we received is dated July $30^{\rm th}$ , 2007.
20	Following the receipt, in the review of this
21	correspondence, which was addressed by Mr. Engelmann, we
22	communicated with Mr. Nadler and we indicated that we felt
23	duty bound to disclose the contents of that correspondence

to all the other parties. We advised Dr. Nadler. He

indicated that he had some difficulty with that and he

1	believed his correspondence to be protected under the
2	Personal Health Information Protection Act.
3	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.
4	MR. DUMAIS: And that he wished to have some
5	sort of proceeding or at least the issue determined.
6	So we still feel duty bound to disclose that
7	correspondence to the parties, Commissioner, and we have
8	not done so yet.
9	Now, my suggestion would be to have this
10	argument made this week, and I was proposing to have the
11	argument first thing Wednesday morning at 9:30 a.m. so that
12	it doesn't delay us.
13	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.

22	this afternoon and tomorrow in a passive mode?
23	THE COMMISSIONER: Exactly.

25	the date of the audiotape that we're about to hear?

6	videotape that was made on February $7^{\rm th}$ , 1997. It is two
7	hours and four minutes, and there's a subsequent videotape
8	that follows this one, and that's Exhibit 573, and was made
9	on February $7^{\rm th}$ , '97 as well, and that videotape is 17
10	minutes.
11	THE COMMISSIONER: Okay. So that would take
12	care of today?
13	MR. DUMAIS: That would
14	THE COMMISSIONER: The only reason I'm
15	trying to coordinate this is for the people on the webcast,
16	because if it's in camera, then we can tell them now to
17	come back tomorrow morning at 9:30.
18	MR. DUMAIS: That's correct, Commissioner.
19	So this videotape has to be heard in an in
20	camera session, as per your ruling back in June. Following
21	those two videotapes, there is one audiotape which can be
22	heard on the web, and it's a videotape an audio tape,
23	sorry, that is dated May $30^{\rm th}$ , 1997. I'm advised it's about
24	30 minutes in length.
25	THE COMMISSIONER: M'hm.

1	MR. DUMAIS: And the last videotape is one
2	that is dated November $25^{th}$ , $1997$ and that's Exhibit $574$ ,
3	and that should be heard in camera as well, and that's a
4	three-hour long videotape.
5	RULING ON MATTERS OF THE VIDEOTAPE PROCEEDING BY THE

8	THE COMMISSIONER: All right.
9	So in answer to your question, Mr. Manson,
10	what I suggest what I had thought of when I got wind of
11	all of whatever it was that we're talking about is that we
12	would take the time to hear all of the videos and see all
13	the videos, and if there's an hour or two tomorrow
14	afternoon, it may be a good time for people to talk about
15	the issue that we're going to be dealing with at 9:30 the
16	next morning. It may be that constructive minds can
17	resolve that issue. I don't know, but I thought we'd give
18	you people some time to talk about that.
19	All right? So unfortunately for those
20	people on the webcast, we will be going in an in camera
21	session immediately, which means that we will be coming
22	back tomorrow morning at 9:30. At 9:30, we will be
23	listening to the audiotape of a conversation between Mr.
24	Dunlop and Mr. Leroux, and then we will go back into an in

camera session to hear the rest of the -- to see and hear

1	the rest of the videotapes.
2	All right.
3	MR. DUMAIS: So just before we break,
4	Commissioner, if we can just with respect to the
5	transcript that we are about to hear this afternoon, it has
6	been filed as an exhibit already, 572.
7	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.
8	MR. DUMAIS: I suggest that we do as we did
9	back in June, that it be filed or that it be amended to
10	read 572(a) and that the actual videotape that we're going
11	to hear today be marked as 572(b).
12	THE COMMISSIONER: Yes.
